THE COWARDICE OF EVIL By Bishop Mike Coyner

The news this week is all about the terrible shooting in Aurora, Colorado, and the NCAA punishment of Penn State University over the ter-

rible child abuse scandal and cover-up by their football program and university leadership. Those two stories have caused me to reflect on the reality of Evil and the violence it often causes. But it has also led me to this realization: Evil is cowardly because Evil always attacks the weak. By contrast, God loves us and sometimes tests us where we are strong to help us become stronger.

Hear the difference? Evil led a football coach to commit horrible acts against children – young boys – and to control them with the power of that coach's

position. How cowardly! Evil led a young man to purchase unbelievable amounts of weaponry and body armor and then to shoot innocent people attending a movie theatre. How cowardly! Evil exerts its power by attacking people where they are weak. Such "power" is really cowardice, although we have to admit that it does challenge us, harm us, and frighten us. Evil's power is cowardly violence.

In the midst of such Evil and tragic results, some people respond by saying "It is God's will." That is wrong. It is never God's will to harm, hurt, or damage the innocent. Even when tragedies come, God is always at work to help make some good come out of those tragedies. I have in my office a framed quote from Romans 8:28 given to me by Dr. Adolf Hansen. It is his own translation of the text after many years of study and personal inquiry, especially following the tragic death of his own daughter. It says profoundly: "God works for good in everything." I believe that.

I also believe that God's love allows us to be tested where we are strong, in order to help us become even stronger. That is a far cry from Evil, which cowardice tries to hurt us where we are weak. God's love tests us and strengthens us much like an athletic trainer helps us to work our muscles and become stronger.

So the real question of discernment when trying times come into our lives – and they always do – is this question: Am I being confronted by the cowardice of Evil which is trying to hurt me where I am already weak? Or am I being strengthened by the love of God which tests and challenges me where I am strong in order to become stronger in my faith?

The two terrible cases in the news this week are obviously the results of Evil at work hurting and cowardly attacking the weak. Other challenges in our lives are less clearly defined.

I hope that this E-pistle might offer some guidance, comfort, and discernment as we go through trying times.

May God continue to love us, challenge us, strengthen us, and lead us in the pathways of God's love.

Our team of 9 youth and 4 adults left for MissionIndy at 2pm Sunday, July 8, for a week of work, devotions, and "fun". We stayed at Grace Christian Church, one of four host churches for MissionIndy, near Mooresville, IN.

Sunday night we found that this week's devotional topic would be on Identity, or who are we in Christ. Each day we read how God

wants us to see ourselves compared to how we see ourselves from the worldview. Monday told us we are <u>Chosen</u> by God, Tuesday we are <u>Adopted</u>. Wednesday was maybe the most difficult to understand, we are <u>Slaves of Christ</u>, but it also brought out some deep intense discussion during our evening time together. Thursday we are told to be <u>Ambassadors for Christ</u>. Closing out Friday, we learned to find where we fit as <u>The Body of Christ</u> by using those unique gifts and talents God has given each of us. Friday night also brought meaningful discussion and a chance for each of us to hear how our gifts and talents are viewed by others.



We did do a lot of work on two houses located about 2 miles east of the Circle and just north of Washington St. One was being demolished, so there were plenty of black-faced girls from tearing out lathe/plaster walls and ceilings. The other house was being restored to house people needing a place to stay right out of rehab or homeless. At this house we




poured a sidewalk, replaced flooring, insulated and hung drywall, and helped replace a broken sewer line.


Chet Rutan reads his part as one of the characters looks on.

Seniors and Summer Heat



Seniors are especially at risk in high heat situations. Large stretches of the USA, including Indiana, are experiencing extreme temperatures at the moment. Care -givers, including churches, need to check on the elderly. If you live in another city, call the police department, or someone you know, to check on your loved one.

Does an elderly person live in your neighborhood? Go knock on the door and ask how things are going. Do NOT accept the first answer. We all want to say, "OH, I'm ok, don't worry." The person may not realize they are

suffering from heat exhaustion. Invite them into air conditioning, offer to take them to an air conditioned mall or other building. Sit in a hospital waiting room. Anything to get out of the heat for a while. Ask a senior to become an overnight guest.

Top ten tips on keeping seniors safe in summer heat

From Living Independently Group

- 1. Drink plenty of liquids eight or more 8-ounce glasses per day and or fruit juices every day to stay hydrated.
- 2. Avoid caffeinated and alcoholic beverages.
- 3. Dress appropriately. Wear loose-fitting clothes in natural fabrics like cotton and dress in light colors that will reflect the sun and heat instead of darker colors that will attract them.
- 4. When outdoors, protect your skin from damage by wearing hats, sunglasses and a sunscreen of 30 SPF or more.
- 5. Stay indoors during extreme heat.
- 6. If you do not have air conditioning in your apartment, go somewhere that does. A movie theater, the mall, a friend or relative's home or a community senior center are all good options.
- 7. If you need to get out of the house and don't drive a car, call a taxi, a friend or a transportation service. Do NOT wait outside for the bus in extreme heat.
- 8. If you are absolutely unable to leave the house and do not have air conditioning, take a cool bath or shower to lower your body temperature on extremely hot days.
- 9. Temperatures inside the home should not exceed 85 degrees Fahrenheit for prolonged periods of time.
- 10. Know the signs of heat stroke (e.g. flushed face, high body temperature, headache, nausea, rapid pulse, dizziness and confusion) and take immediate action if you feel them coming on.

Bishop Coyner to Return to Indiana for Third Term

AKRON, Ohio – The North Central Jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church announced Thursday afternoon, July 19, during its conference in Akron, the assignment of Bishop Michael J. Coyner to Indiana for his third term as Bishop of the Indiana Area.

Coyner, who during the past eight years, led in uniting the former North and South Indiana conferences of the church into the new Indiana Conference, will remain in Indiana based at the Indiana Conference Center of the church located in Indianapolis.

The announcement was good news to the 36 lay and clergy

delegates of Indiana who asked the NCJ Conference Episcopacy Committee to return Coyner to Indiana. Bishops serve four-year terms; however, they are usually moved after two terms in one area. They can be permitted to serve a third term by the jurisdictional conference at the recommendation of the 20-member NJC Episcopacy Committee.
