## An E-pistle ...

from Bishop Mike

"Making a difference in Indiana ... and around the world."



Recently, the left rear tire on my car starting losing air. My car has a warning light to let me know when a tire is low on air pressure, so each time the warning light came on I would stop at a gas

station and put some more air into the tire. With modern tires it is almost impossible to tell a tire is low just by looking at it, so I was grateful for the warning light. When it got to the point that I had to add air nearly every day, I took my car in for a tire repair. Unfortunately they discovered a nail in the sidewall of my tire, so the tire is ruined, and I had to get a new one.

That slow leak has become, for me, a parable of what can go wrong with our spiritual life, with our life as a church, and with our ministry as lay or clergy leaders. We can get a "slow leak" and lose energy, passion, drive, commitment, or direction. It can happen so slowly that we don't notice. The decline can be indiscernible to others, and it can deceive us as well.

Finally the "warning light" goes on – and our church statistics look bad, our worship becomes dull, our work ethic declines, or our trust in God's grace diminishes so much that we become exhausted from doing ministry on our strength, skill, insight, and desire.

I have gone through times when my own ministry seemed to have a "slow leak" – haven't you? I have seen churches which have lost

their focus and direction – haven't you? It happens slowly. It happens without any planning or intentionality. Churches don't vote and say, "Let's slowly decline over the next 20 years." Pastors don't plan to lose their way. Lay leaders don't choose to get discouraged. It happens slowly.

To change the metaphor from leaking tires, I am remembering what one rancher told me about his herd of sheep. He said, "Sheep nibble their way into being lost." It's that way with our ministry, our spiritual life, and our church focus. We don't set out with a plan or desire to get lost, we just "nibble our way into being lost" as we make hundreds of little decisions without a clear focus upon God's will for our lives. Each of those hundreds of little decisions can seem inconsequential on their own, but they add up – they add up to a "flat tire" without enough Spirit, and they add up to nibbling our way to being lost.

Do you have a "slow leak" in your spiritual life? The Good News is that you can be re-inflated by the Spirit of the Living Christ who stands ready to energize you. So, watch for the warning signs, don't get comfortable with "good enough" or mediocrity, and don't nibble your way into being lost. Receive a fresh dose of the Spirit to re-inflate your life and ministry.

The place we worked at is the Methodist Children's Home of Mississippi. The place is 160 acres. It was once owned by the Baptist Conference then was not in use for over five years. The Methodist Conference bought it and is in the process of bringing it

back to life. Last year, Gary worked on one of the houses and we were able to see it. It now has ten girls living in it. It was wonderful, bright, clean and a great home for the girls. This year they worked on another house hoping to have it ready for more girls by mid-July. The group we work with has been together for over ten years, they all work together like a well-oiled machine. They still have trouble seeing Gary's visions! (Don't' we all!!) It was a great week of serving.

## ***More on Methodist Children's Homes***

### **Who does the Methodist Children's Homes serve?**

The majority of our children living on campus are those that came to us through the Department of Human Services after they were removed from abusive or neglectful homes. A few of our children are placed privately because of authority issues.

### **How many children live on campus?**

Right now, 53 children live on campus, and the maximum is 56. This total changes weekly as new children arrive and others have the opportunity to be reunified with their parents, move to independent living or are placed with foster families.

### **What are the ages and genders of the children?**

We have both girl cottages and boy cottages on our campus with ages ranging between 10-21 years old. Our foster care families can minister to both boys and girls ranging from 0-18 years old.

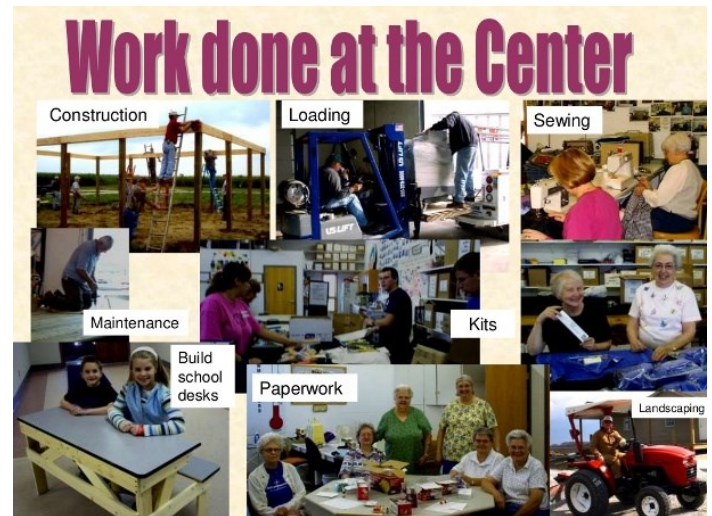
***Volunteers Needed!***

**Kits are assembled and packed.**



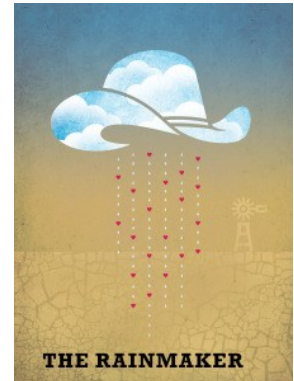

## ***Emmaus Gathering at our church***

**Friday, June 19 at 6:15 pm**

**Joyce Harvey recently completed the Walk to Emmaus--  
May it continue to be a joy and a blessing in her life!**

**Our church is host!**--CFUMC is hosting the El Shaddai Emmaus Community gathering. Even if you haven't attended a Walk, you're welcome to come and fellowship and worship with us and be updated with the latest news in the community. We begin with finger foods at 6:15 and 7:00 is worship. Please come and meet your local community. Contact Brian Hutchinson. Read the following to better understand what it's all about.

### **About the Walk to Emmaus**

The Walk to Emmaus is an experience of Christian spiritual renewal and formation that begins with a three-day short course in Christianity. It is an opportunity to meet Jesus Christ in a new way as God's grace and love is revealed to you through other believers. The Walk to Emmaus experience begins with the prayerful discernment and invitation from a sponsor. After one accepts this invitation they complete an application. The Emmaus leaders prayerfully consider each applicant and in God's time, the person is invited to attend a three-day experience of New Testament Christianity as a lifestyle.

Following the three-day experience, participants are joined in small groups to support each other in their ongoing walk with Christ.

### **Who should go to Emmaus?**

Emmaus is open to members of any Christian denomination. Emmaus is for the development of Christian leaders who:

- >Are members of a local church
- >Have a desire to strengthen their spiritual lives
- >May have unanswered questions about their faith
- >Understand that being a Christian involves responsibility
- >Are willing to dedicate their everyday lives to God in an ongoing manner.

### **What happens on the Emmaus Weekend?**


You will enjoy three days of singing, learning, laughing, worshipping, reflecting, praying and participating in small groups. Discussions center around fifteen talks given by laity and clergy. These talks present the theme of God's grace, how that grace comes alive in the Christian community and how it is expressed in the world. You'll also discover how grace is real in your life, how you live a life of grace, and how you bring that grace to others.

You will have the opportunity to participate in the daily celebration of Holy Communion and to understand more fully the body of Christ. You will experience God's grace through the prayers and acts of anonymous service offered by the Emmaus community. You will leave with an experience of Christian love in action that will equip you for new levels of grace-filled service and leadership.

### **What Happens After Emmaus Weekend?**

You are invited to have a closer walk with Christ for the rest of your life; this is called the Fourth Day. Those who attend a Walk to Emmaus are encouraged to: 1. Expand their own spiritual lives through worship, study and active participation in their local church. 2. Become more active disciples of Christ in service to the world. To nurture this process of discipleship, the Emmaus movement offers specific opportunities. First, groups of four to six people meet weekly to reflect on their spiritual journey and encourage one another. Second, there are monthly community gatherings where Emmaus participants meet for fellowship, worship and instruction. Third, community members are regularly informed of the support needs of upcoming Walk to Emmaus weekends, and other opportunities for servant leadership
