## BackPack Packing Begins August 22

On July 24, Blake Natalie, 5, and his grandmother, Roxi Natalie, sold lemonade and cookies to help the Backpack Program. He raised \$137 in only $21 / 2$ hours! When his customers heard that Blake was raising money for the Backpack Program, they gave generously. Last year; 200 plus children a week benefited.
Blake's parents are Bryan Natalie and Tanya Wyndam. His grandparents are Larry and Roxi Natalie.
Shelby Marsolf reports that packing food for BackPack will resume on Thursdays, starting Aug. 22 (to give schools some time to identify and get permission slips from students who will receive the bags). The packs start at 2:00pm (set up a little earlier) in the BackPack room in the basement of CFUMC.
Can You Lift?-Volunteers Needed--Shelby writes, "We could especially use someone able to lift, even just to be on-call, to help deliver the food totes to schools as the boxes are filled.
Another need is someone available during the day with a large vehicle to pick up shelf-stable milk ( 600 pounds?) about once per month in Terre Haute. Sometimes we have scheduled this to coordinate with the packing times, so that lifting wouldn't even be a requirement, as long as there are people at the pack able to help move the milk from the vehicle to the shelves!
"A few packers will be unable to return this year, so a couple new volunteers would be helpful.
"Food donations are welcome all school year! We avoid items with nuts or peanut butter in the ingredients list. While we expect to send 200250 bags of food each week, the bags are often not identical, so smaller donations are accepted. Common foods include $100 \%$ juice box, individual cereal, canned pasta (ravioli,

spaghetti o's, etc.), block of ramen, fruit cup, and applesauce cup. When we get donations or inexpensive snack items, we include those, too. Examples of snacks would be small packages of cookies, chips, pretzels, microwave popcorn (any size), fruit snacks, Pop-Tarts, oatmeal pies, etc."


Financial Contributions--Shelby continues, "In many cases, we've
 identified the most cost-effective places to purchase our regular items, so financial contributions may go further. Checks can be made out to Clinton First with BackPack clearly marked in the memo or made out to CFUMC BackPack Program. Members can place these in offering plate, and they will be acknowledged on their giving statement. Donations may also be sent to Clinton First United Methodist Church BackPack Program, PO Box I86, Clinton, IN 47842, and they'll be acknowledged in a separate letter. Questions can be emailed to backpackbags@hotmail.com or just ask Shelby. The church has donated the space. Elanco and the church have donated the shelves and tables. All the work is done by volunteers.
That means donations go entirely to getting food to the children!!!"
