Kairos: Miracles in a Prison!

This is a Must Read! Pastor Charlie Jackson writes about the Putnamville Prison and the power of the Holy Spirit!



To the People of the Clinton First Ignited Methodist Church,

I want to thank everyone who made my weekend at the Putnamville #18 Kairos possible. It was an amazing experience and it happened only because loving, caring, committed

Christians like you made it possible. Kairos is a 4- day weekend within the prison helping 30 offenders find God and build a church inside the walls of their confinement. If you've ever been on a Walk to Emmaus weekend—Kairos is like that, but designed to bring the Holy Spirit to the incarcerated offenders.

I saw miracles happen this weekend....A man who had been imprisoned from the age of 19 until he was 43 knelt and gave his life to Jesus Christ. This man had been the leader of the Satanic coven within Putnamville, and after seeing the genuine love of Christ offered by the volunteers who came to the prison for Kairos weekend, he accepted the forgiveness of the Holy Spirit and asked Jesus to come into his heart. What makes this even more amazing is that Satan knew he was going to do this, and tried time and time again to interfere with the Kairos weekend. First, Satan sent a snowstorm.... I didn't go because the roads were too bad. Again and again, Satan attacked. By the 3rd meeting we had nearly 50 Christian men who said they wanted to help with Putnamville #18. But as the months progressed, man after man had to drop off.... From over 50, our numbers had dwindled to 27 men. Now, there is supposed to be an outside volunteer for each offender during Kairos. David, Easterday [the leader] after much prayer, decided to keep 5 tables of 6 offenders so we could possibly help 30 prisoners find Christ. David confided to us at the weekend, that if he had dropped another table—the one he would have dropped was the one to which the Satanist had been assigned!! What a miracle!! God won!! Satan lost, and because of the respect that particular offender has, it is possible that the entire Satanic coven at Putnamville might disband and its members turn to Christ! What an amazing God we serve!!

It is because of people like you that God can win spiritual battles like the one I was part of this past weekend. Kairos is much more than baking cookies and coloring place mats. It is **99.99% prayer!** I thank you all for your prayers. The offenders were shown prayer chains that symbolized the

hundreds of Christians on the outside who praying for them. The offenders were humbled that people, people who did not even know them, would take time to pray for them, and to tell them that God loved them.

The Cookie Miracle Many of you did make cookies. I'll call it the cookie miracle. As you might know, every single person at Putnamville got a bag of 6 chocolate chip cookies—the 2,000 offenders, the correction officers, the administrative staff, the teachers, nurses, everyone. And believe me, the 30 offenders who were part of Kairos loved those cookies!! On Saturday, we talked about the importance of forgiveness. We stressed that until we forgive those who we are angry with; our heart hasn't got space for the Holy Spirit to come into. Each offender and each of us too, wrote on a piece of rice paper the names of everyone we could think of that we might hold animosity toward. We then had a ceremony where we put our rice paper with the names into a bowl of water and prayed that the Holy Spirit would start the process of helping us forgive everyone on the list. As the paper dissolved in the water, we told them that God now was working to help them forgive these people who had hurt them.

At the end of the day, each offender was given two bags of chocolate chip cookies. One bag was for the offender, the other bag was to be given to the person in the prison, that that offender needed most to forgive.

On Sunday we had a time for any offender who wished, to tell what the weekend meant to them. One young man, came to the mike and confessed how hard, Saturday night had been. He said he took the bag of cookies and dropped it on the bunk of a man who he had struggled with since his first day at Putnamville. He said he told the man, "These are for you." He said the man replied, "I don't want your damn cookies." But the Kairos participant just kept on walking over to his bunk. After a couple of minutes, he looked up, and the man who hated him was on his bunk eating the cookies. John went over to him and said, "I'm sorry for whatever I did to make you angry with me. I'd like to start over if you want to." The man said he thought that would be a good idea! Praise God! You might not think that was a miracle but I did.

Another offender that same night came with his cookie story. Now, this man was 6 feet, 8 inches tall if he was an inch and weighed no less than 400 pounds. He was highly respected (naturally?) by everyone at the Kairos and within the compound. His name was Billy Jr. Billy came to the mike and said that when he got to the dorm with his two bags of cookies—he put both of them in his box.

That got a big laugh, until he said why he did it. "We were told to give that second bag of cookies to the man we most needed to forgive. That's why I gave that bag to me. I needed to forgive myself. Now that I have done that, I can forgive others!" Wow! Talk about understanding the importance of forgiveness. We can never fully forgive others until we ask God to forgive us, and then forgive ourselves.

Time after time I saw Christ working during this weekend. Hard men, men who couldn't trust anyone, slowly let their guard down, tore down the walls they had built up thinking that having walls was the only way to survive in prison—they felt our love, they felt **your love**. You made a difference this week in the lives of 30 men at Putnamville. For that I thank you, and I know God thanks you too.

Again, in whatever way you helped: cookies, prayer, meal tickets, monetary contributions—without you this weekend would not have been possible. I will be returning to Putnamville in a week for a follow-up training session, and then will return once a month to stay in touch with the Kairos church (there are over 170 men at Putnamville who have been through this Kairos experience.). Please continue to pray for me and for this work that God has started. If you would like to learn more about Kairos and how you can get more involved, contact me and I will be glad to tell you about how God can use you in an amazing ministry.


Katie Marie Shew
